Introduction

The Planning Guide includes information on how to plan your course and subject schedules indicating the years when the subjects will be offered. You will see that some subjects are offered every year and others in alternate years. The schedule is not a guarantee that a given subject will be available in a particular year. Changed circumstances can lead to variations.

Subjects are grouped into nine subject fields: Languages (LA), Old Testament (OT), New Testament (NT), Theology (TH), Church History (CH), Philosophy and Ethics (PE), Evangelism and Mission (EM), Pastoral Church Focussed Ministries (PC) and Developmental Ministry (DM).

Morling internal Three and Four Year Awards

Some students will wish to complete a standard Morling three or four award in addition to the completion of a BMin, BTh, MDiv or three year Advanced Diploma of Theology/Ministry. Information concerning the requirements of the two standard Morling awards is provided in this Planning Guide (see the table of contents). You are advised to make a photocopy.

ACT Graduate Diploma in Ministry

BTh and BMin students who wish to receive the four year Morling award (which fulfils the academic requirements for accreditation) have the opportunity to complete a Graduate Diploma in Ministry. This constitutes a special and separate strand for fourth year students.

Some students, however may be unable to take advantage of the Graduate Diploma in Ministry in 2006. In this case, you are able to complete an Advanced Diploma together with your degree, or use internal subjects in your fourth year. Consult with Brian Powell.

Graduate Certificate/Diploma in Counselling

No information (other than the subject schedule) is provided here about these awards. See Course Coordinator if you are interested in these awards now or in the future. This could affect your choice of subjects. A booklet giving full details is available from the office.

Enrolment with the ACT

In addition to enrolling for each subject at Morling College, it is also necessary to enrol with the ACT. This is done by enrolling on both Morling and ACT enrolment forms, which are usually secured together. There is a small fee per subject which is passed on to the ACT. It is your responsibility to indicate whether your subjects are to be enrolled with the ACT. See the Academic Coordinator for further details.

A Note About SEBL (2008 and subsequent years)

Morling College requires that all full-time students must enrol in SEBL. From Semester 1 2008 a new procedure for SEBL will operate. Until now, Morling College has required students to do SEBL over six semesters, and has required them to pay only the ACT Registration fee for SEBL, and only in the last of those six semesters. Additionally, where they attended a day-workshop as part of SEBL, students were charged \$50 to cover costs for that workshop. Students re-enrolling in SEBL will continue to pay only the ACT registration fee for the subject, and the ACT will accept four semesters of SEBL for full credit for the subject towards an Award.

Any re-enrolling SEBL student need only complete four semesters of SEBL in order for it to be credited to an Award; such a student in 2008 will enrol retrospectively in any discrete quarters of SEBL already completed, plus the quarter to be completed in Semester 1 2008, and pay the respective quarters of the ACT Registration fee. This will be made clear on the enrolment forms.

Any new SEBL student will henceforth pay the usual Morling subject fee for SEBL (as well as the ACT Registration fee) and will enrol in each semester-length quarter of SEBL as a discrete subject. This will be made clear on the enrolment forms. After all four quarters have been completed the subject will be credited to the student's Award. SEBL is compulsory for two Awards (the Bachelor of Ministry and the Advanced Diploma of Ministry). Where SEBL is not required for the student's Award, Morling requires that a full-time student do SEBL anyway, and if the student does not wish SEBL to count towards the Award, the student may choose an additional subject for which Morling will waive 100% of the Morling tuition fee (only the ACT Registration fee need be paid for this subject.)

SEBL after four semesters

Because Morling College requires all full-time students to be involved in SEBL-type activities, after the fourth semester of SEBL, when ASCT requirements for the subject have been met, 3rd & 4th year: full-time students will belong to a 'ministry stream group' in their area of interest. These will not be called 'SEBL' but 'stream groups' because they will be additional to the four required semesters of SEBL. It is especially important for Accreditation students that they continue in SEBL-type activities through a total of eight semesters. These additional semesters will cost nothing to students, unless a student chooses to attend a group led by a visiting facilitator.

Morling Three and Four Year Awards

The standard Morling Three and Four Year Awards require the completion of particular subjects. The Graduate in Christian Ministries (Advanced) is for students seeking to fulfil accreditation requirements and for those seeking the same training as Baptist ministers. A statement of requirements is available in this Planning Guide (see the table of contents). Make your own photocopy of these requirements.

AdvDipMin course requirements

The AdvDipMin requires the completion of 24 subjects (96 credit points). This is normally combined with the Morling Three Year Award, so the suggested sequence of subjects below is designed to cover the requirements of this award as well as the ACT requirements.

The core subjects must be completed by all students:

- ◆ Old Testament introduction subjects (eight credit points):
 - OT201 Formative Old Testament Traditions
 - OT202 From Israel to Judea
- ◆ New Testament introduction subjects (eight credit points):

Note: The project and five other subjects must be taken from fields PC, EM and DM, and these five must include at least one subject from each of two fields (not counting PC249 SEBL). For example, you might make up the five subjects by choosing two from PC, two from EM and one from DM.

For the Morling Three Year Award, you need to include one Missiology subject, and PE211 Ethics and Contemporary Problems. You also need to take a Field Education in your second year. PC201 Ministry Formation (Year 1) is a pre-requisite for Field Education. Field Education is a prerequisite for PC235 Principles of Leadership and Management (or for the internal subjects MC461 and MC462).

Advanced Diploma of Theology (ACT)

The Advanced Diploma of Theology requires the completion of 24 subjects (96 credit points).

As this award requires more subjects from the Theology field (TH) than Morling currently offers, special arrangements need to be made with the Diploma Course Adviser if you wish to do this course.

BTh course requirements

The BTh requires the completion of 24 semester-length subjects, each uniformly worth four credit points, hence a total of 96 credit points.

The 18 subjects listed below are compulsory. The remaining six subjects are electives:

BMin course requirements

The BMin requires the completion of 23 semester length subjects plus SEBL, each uniformly worth four credit points. The required number of credit points is thus 96.

Bachelor of Ministry (Honours) (ACT)

Students will follow the Year 1 and Year 2 programs outlined above. The normal requirements of the BMin will be fulfilled. Consult the ACT Manual and the BMin Course Adviser for the full Honours requirements.

Bachelor of Christian Studies (ACT)

The Bachelor of Christian Studies provides tertiary students with a program of theological studies in order to apply a Christian perspective to their life in the world, including their professional and vocational life. The BCS may be completed by full-time or part-time study. The minimum period of study is three years and the maximum is nine years.

BCS course requirements

The entrance requirement is qualification into an Australian university. Mature age entry is possible for students who are 21 years of age or more.

The regulations require candidates to complete 24 semester-length subjects including:

- ◆ OT301 Formative Old Testament Traditions *and* OT302 From Israel to Judea
- ◆ NT301 Content and Setting of the Gospel Tradition *and* NT302 Early New Testament Church
- ◆ CH301 The Church to 1550 *and* CH302 The Church from 1550 to modern Times
- ◆ At least two of TH401 Knowledge of God, TH402 Doctrine of God and work of Christ, TH403 Doctrine of Grace and Eschatology *or* TH404 Church, Sacraments and Ministry
- ◆ At least two Old Testament and/or New Testament exegesis subjects
- ◆ At least eight subjects of study in a non-theological field such as business, psychology, physical sciences, comparative religions, preferably done simultaneously with the theological subjects
- ◆ One project of independent study that relates the non-theological area of study to the Christian faith
- ◆ Minimum of four type A electives
 - one of these could be PC449 (a,b,c,d) Supervised Experience Based Learning (four credit points). SEBL is not a compulsory BCS subject but Morling expects all full time students to complete it. Students must enrol in it with the ACT in each of four semesters for one credit point per semester, and pay one-quarter of the ACT fee per semester.
- ◆ Maximum of two type B electives

Associate Degree of Theology (ACT)

The Associate Degree of Theology is a two year course requiring the completion of 64 credit points. Two years is the minimum time of candidature without advanced standing. The maximum time of candidature is six years.

The regulations require candidates to complete 16 semester-length subjects including:

- ◆ OT301 Formative Old Testament Traditions *and* OT302 From Israel to Judea
- ◆ NT301 Content and Setting of the Gospel Tradition *and* NT302 Early New Testament Church
- ◆ CH301 The Church to 1550 *or* CH302 The Church from 1550 to Modern Times
- ◆ At least one of TH401 Knowledge of God, TH402 Doctrine of God and work of Christ, TH403 Doctrine of Grace and Eschatology *or* TH404 Church, Sacraments and Ministry
- ◆ At least two Old Testament and/or New Testament exegesis subjects.

In Addition all students must take;

- ◆ A further two subjects from either CH or TH field.
- ◆ One project must be taken (**490) in a unit field of the department in which the major has been undertaken.

Specialisations

Other regulations include;

- ◆ No more than two Type B electives can be taken toward the award, and can contribute to the specialisation.
- ◆ No more than 28 Credit points of foundational level subjects can be counted in the course. Biblical Hebrew (LA003a/b) and New Testament Greek (LA304) are excluded from this requirement.
- ◆ In general four core foundational (300 level) subjects must be passed before students can take advanced level (400) subjects.

Graduate Diploma in Ministry (ACT)

Note: Students may find difficulty in satisfying the requirements of the MDiv, Grad.Dip.Min and Graduate in Christian Ministries (Advanced) in four normal years. If so, they should discuss this with the Course Adviser.

Graduate Diploma of Divinity

(formerly *Graduate Diploma in Bible and Ministry*)

The Graduate Diploma of Divinity is a one year full time equivalent course (32 credit points), and articulates into the MDiv. The Master of Divinity (MDiv) is a three year full time equivalent course (96 credit points).

Should GradDipDiv students wish to proceed to the MDiv it is possible to receive up to 32 credit points advanced standing. Students transferring to the MDiv will surrender their GradDip if it has been awarded.

Eligibility

The MDiv and GradDip require a non-theological degree from a recognised university. Graduates in theology are not eligible to enrol.

Except for those candidates who have a tertiary qualification taught in English, international candidates whose first language is not English will be required to sit an IELTS test. For candidates wishing to enrol in the MDiv or GradDipDiv, an average score of 6.5 is required with no score under 6.0 in any test.

Master of Divinity

Full details are provided above (see the table of contents).

Graduate Diploma of Divinity

This course is intended to provide a one year (full time equivalent) program of studies in the Christian faith for graduates with no formal qualifications in theological studies. It aims to:

- ♦ provide candidates with the biblical and theological/historical foundations of the Christian faith, which may serve as the framework within which other Christian studies may be undertaken
- ♦ enable candidates to reflect on aspects of Christian faith and practice according to their interests
- ♦ serve the churches and theological institutions in their commitment to the theological education of the laity.

Course requirements

The minimum period of study is two semesters. After four years candidature will lapse unless special provision is granted by the Board of Delegates of the ACT.

The GradDipDiv consists of 32 credit points (eight subjects). Subjects are chosen from the MDiv but normal ACT subject prerequisites for the MDiv do not apply.

- ♦ at least eight credit points (two subjects) from introductory OT and NT subjects:
 - OT501 Formative Old Testament Traditions
 - OT502 From Israel to Judea
 - NT501 Content and Setting of the Gospel Tradition
 - NT502 Early New Testament Church
- ♦ at least four credit points in Church History or Theology
- ♦ 20 credit points from any 500 or 600 level subjects in any field.

Recommendations regarding subject choice

The following should be considered:

- ♦ complete one or more of the introductory OT and NT subjects before attempting a Theology (TH) or Ethics (PE) or OT/NT exegesis subject
- ♦ Foundations of Pastoral Care is a prerequisite for Pastoral Skills and Methods
- ♦ the Research Project (if taken) is completed in the final semester/year of your study program.

Graduate Diploma in Christian Studies

The Graduate Diploma in Christian Studies is a one year full time equivalent (32 credit points) course, which articulates into the Master of Arts (Christian Studies) (MACS). The MACS is a two year full time equivalent (64 credit points) course designed for students who wish to relate their previous tertiary study, and perhaps employment, to their Christian faith.

Eligibility

The MACS and GradDip Christian Studies require a non-theological degree from a recognised university.

Course requirements

Students initially enrol in the GradDip Christian Studies, rather than the MACS, and first complete the requirements of the GradDip.

The GradDip requires 32 credit points, with 16 credit points drawn from core foundational 500 subjects. Another 12 credit points will come from the 600 subjects, including eight credit points in Theology. There is the possibility that 700 subjects can be included. Four credit points will come from the field of Integrative Studies in the form of a minor project. Each 500 and 600 subject is worth four credit points, and each 700 subject is worth eight credit points.

To receive the MACS, the student proceeds to a further 32 credit points at the 600 level (note that up to 16 credit points can be selected from 700 subjects). At least eight credit points will be in subjects chosen from the field of Integrative Studies (IN), with a further eight credit points for the independent integrative study project which relates the student's non-theological studies to their Christian faith.

Students who proceed to the MACS will need to surrender their GradDip upon completion of the MACS.

Recommendations regarding subject choice

Subjects available are the same as for the MDiv (500 and 600 subjects). Consult with the MDiv Course Adviser before choosing subjects for the GradDip stage, and the Postgraduate Adviser concerning the second stage.

Graduate Diploma in Ministry

The Graduate Diploma in Ministry is a one year full time equivalent (32 credit points) course designed for students who wish to further their theological studies in the area of practical ministry. It articulates into the Master of Arts (Ministry) which requires the completion of a further 32 credit points.

Students who go on to complete the MA (Min) would need to surrender the GradDip Ministry if it has been awarded

Eligibility

The normal entry requirement is a BMin or equivalent.

Course requirements

The GradDip Ministry requires the following:

- ◆ 32 credit points (four subjects) in 700 level subjects (MA subjects)
- ◆ 24 of these credit points will be taken from the areas of Evangelism and Mission (EM), Pastoral and Church Focussed Ministry (PC) and Developmental Ministry (DM)

At Morling the GradDip Ministry will normally form the basis for the final year at College for those wishing to complete the Graduate in Christian Ministries (Advanced).

Further details about the specific requirements of the Graduate in Christian Ministries (Advanced) are provided elsewhere (see the table of contents).

Requirements for the Morling Three Year Award Graduate in Christian Ministries

1. Normally, satisfactory completion of one or more of MDiv, BMin, BTh or the AdvDipTh/Min of the ACT.
2. In conjunction with ACT requirements, the following specific ACT and Morling subjects are required:
 - i. Ministry Formation **or** Patterns of Spiritual Formation
 - ii. Field Education Theory and ACT Field Education Practical
 - iii. Supervised Experience Based Learning (SEBL)
 - iv. Four credit points in Missiology
 - v. Four credit points in Ethics.
 - vi. Four credit points in Evangelism
3. All students will be required to complete at least one year of full time study. Full time study requires a high level of involvement in College life, including not less than ten classroom hours per week each semester.

Full time students are required to attend regularly the weekly College Chapel services (at least 80%), SEBL groups, all College retreats, two College partnership missions and one missions ReachOut conference. They are to be actively involved in the life and ministry of a local congregation, under supervision, for the duration of their College course. At the conclusion of each year students will acknowledge in writing that they have fulfilled these requirements.
4. All students will be required to complete at least 25 subjects, not including SEBL. At least four subjects in Biblical exegesis are to be completed. For the purpose of this regulation, 700 level subjects will not be given additional weight.

Requirements for the Morling Four Year Award Graduate in Christian Ministries (Advanced)

1. Normally, satisfactory completion of one or more of MDiv, BMin, BTh, or the AdvDipTh/Min of the ACT.
2. In conjunction with ACT requirements, the following specific ACT and Morling subjects will be required:
 - i. Foundations of Pastoral Care **and** Pastoral Skills and Methods
 - ii. Ministry Formation **or** Patterns of Spiritual Formation
 - iii. A total of twelve credit points (three subjects) from Evangelism and Mission (EM), with eight chosen from one area and four from the other. Four credit points will be from **either** Foundations of Evangelism/Evangelism Principles **or** Communicating Globally/Cross Cultural Communication. The remaining eight credit points will be chosen from:

Evangelism: Church Dynamics and Growth, Foundations of Evangelism/Evangelism Principles, Applied Evangelism, Christian Apologetics, Church Planting, Church in Australian Society

Mission: Theology of Mission, Cultural Anthropology, Living Faiths, Study of Religion, Communicating Locally and Globally, Multicultural Ministry, Aid and Development
 - iv. Field Education Theory and ACT Field Education Practical Subject
 - v. Principles of Homiletics **and** Advanced Preaching
 - vi. Supervised Experience Based Learning (SEBL, four semesters) followed by SEBL-type “stream groups” for the following four semesters, making eight in all.
 - vii. New Testament Greek **or** Introduction to New Testament Greek **or** Biblical Hebrew
 - viii. Denominational (Baptist) Distinctives
 - ix. Pastoral Leadership (Morling)
 - x. Four credit points of Ethics
 - xi. At least 16 credit points (four subjects) of Biblical exegesis, two subjects in each of Old Testament and New Testament. In addition, a Bible or Theology subject will be completed in the final year.
3. All students are required to complete at least **two years** of full-time study. Full-time study requires a high level of involvement in College life, including at least ten classroom hours per week each semester. Students will normally complete at least one subject from each of Old Testament, New Testament, Theology/Ethics/Apologetics and Pastoral Studies over the final two years of study.

Full time students are required to attend regularly the weekly College Chapel services (at least 80%), SEBL groups, all College retreats, three College partnership missions and one missions ReachOut conference. They are to be actively involved in the life and ministry of a local congregation, under supervision, for the duration of their College course. At the conclusion of each year students will acknowledge in writing that they have fulfilled these requirements.

The final year of the Graduate in Christian Ministries (Advanced) must be completed as a full time student, with a load of no less than seven subjects across the year, unless a student is granted special dispensation by the faculty.
4. All students are required to complete at least 32 subjects, not including SEBL/stream groups. For the purpose of this regulation, 700 level subjects will not be given additional weight. The MDiv research project will be counted as two subjects, and the BMin or BTh Honours thesis will be counted as three.
